Public Policy: Student Loans

2019 IS A CALL TO ACTION FOR WOMEN

<u>AAUW's report, Women Deeper in Debt and Student Loans</u>, finds that women are predominately affected by student loan debt; they hold almost two-thirds (\$929 billion) of the country's \$1.46 trillion student debt.

At the same time, women comprise a growing majority of higher education students. Women are projected to earn 57 percent of bachelor's degrees in 2019, and women will outpace men in obtaining degrees at all levels of higher education, yet women take about two years longer than men to repay student loans and are more likely to struggle economically as they do so.

Women borrow more, and because of the gender pay gap—wherein women earn 80 cents for every dollar paid to men—they also take longer to pay off their loans. As a result, they often put off saving for retirement, buying a home or starting a business. The cost of college attendance is at a record high; it has more than doubled over the past generation, while household incomes have barely increased. Students are taking out more loans and leaving school with an unprecedented level of student debt. The problem is even worse for women of color. Across all levels of education, white men are paid more than women of all races. And white men are often paid more than women of color who have more education.

This must change. AAUW is calling upon lawmakers to safeguard and expand Pell Grants. Meanwhile, President Donald J. Trump submitted a revised budget request that would remove nearly \$3.9 billion from Pell Grants, as opposed to the original \$2 billion proposed in March. The proposed revised budget would reallocate the additional \$1.9 billion to other projects, including increased funding for NASA.

AAUW encourages Congress to safeguard and expand Pell Grants and other forms of aid for students; to support efforts to move toward tuition-free and debt-free options for students; and to address both the academic and overall financial needs of students, including affordable access to child care.

What can you do? Contact your representatives and voice your opinions! Make sure your Senators and Congresspersons know that you consider this issue important.

Public Policy: Equality Act

2019 IS A CALL TO ACTION FOR WOMEN

AAUW is asking us all to take action on the following issues:

While we recently celebrated the 65th anniversary of the landmark Supreme Court decision *Brown v. Board of Education* in which the Court ruled that state laws segregating schools by race were unconstitutional, the struggle to ensure all students have equal access to education continues. Our schools remain deeply segregated along racial lines. Studies show that segregated black schools tend to be poorly funded and are often



more likely than integrated or mostly white schools to use punitive school discipline, like suspension and expulsion. And once unthinkable, several nominees for lifetime judicial appointments are refusing to affirm the case was rightly decided.

Several steps the current administration has taken that threaten the recent progress towards equity in education include rolling back guidance addressing racial disparities in school discipline and proposing new Title IX regulations that would undermine equal access to education based on sex and gender identification. While the House passage of the Equality Act (a groundbreaking civil rights bill that would help ensure educational protections for LGBTQ students, among other protections) on May 17 in a bi-partisan vote of 236-173, is cause for optimism, it faces a steep fight in the Senate (S.788) and needs our support via the Two Minute Activist (AAUW Website) or 5 Calls app on your phone.

Despite significant progress, discrimination remains a persistent problem for LGBTQ Americans. The Equality Act (H.R. 5/S. 788) would address the current patchwork of state and local laws and incorporate existing court rulings to provide explicit and comprehensive nondiscrimination protections nationwide. The Equality Act would mean that LGBTQ Americans would have protections across areas of life including employment, housing, credit, education, public spaces and services, federally-funded programs and jury service. The bill would also update our civil rights laws to provide important new protections against sex discrimination, including on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity, in public spaces, by providers of goods and services, and by entities that take federal dollars. This means that women who experience sexual harassment on public transportation, in restaurants or in stores would have a remedy; breastfeeding mothers couldn't be excluded from public spaces; and pharmacists couldn't refuse to fill someone's birth control prescription.
