

AAUW Public Policy Update

On August 22, we commemorated #BlackWomensEqualPay Day, the symbolic day when Black women's earnings "catch up" to white men's earnings from the previous year! Past issues of <u>Coastline</u> have discussed the inequality of pay for women of color inside the already unequal pay for all women. Black women in the United States, who are paid, on average, 61 cents for every dollar paid to white, non-Hispanic men, have to work almost 20 months just to be paid the same amount others received in just 12 months. This gross inequality must be addressed. Contact your local representatives and advocate that they reject the proposed changes to SNAP benefits, which provide food assistance to low income people (BBCE).

Call to action: Contact Dianne Feinstein, Kamala Harris and Mike Levin using your 5 Calls app on your phone. Remember the app provides you with background information, a script in case you feel a little uncertain, and directs your call to the office of each of your reps.

This important date also fell just a few days before Women's Equality Day on August 26, which marks the adoption of the Nineteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution 99 years ago. Women's Equality Day was created on this anniversary to raise awareness about the importance of gender equality and recognize the sacrifices made by the suffragists. While this is an important celebration, not all women were able to exercise the right to vote immediately after passage of the amendment. Like Black Women's Equal Pay Day falling months after overall Equal Pay Day – which marks the pay gap between all women and all men – many women of color, as well as other populations, continue to face legal barriers that hinder their right to vote, particularly but not exclusively in some Southern states whose legislatures have tried to roll back key provisions of the Voting Rights Act. In addition, formerly incarcerated women still do not have the right to vote in California if they were convicted of a felony and are still on probation. As we kick off the centennial year of women winning the right to vote, we mustn't romanticize the story of the 19th Amendment. The truth is, progress towards a more perfect democracy is often messy, and the 19th Amendment did not break down voting barriers for all women—and even today, there is more work to be done.

Call to action: Encourage all the working women you know to **register for Work Smart** online. AAUW is training millions of women to be their own strongest advocates when negotiating their salaries, knowing that future income grows from wherever that beginning salary started.

Speech Trek Gives Girls A Voice

The Eleanor Stem Allen Memorial Speech Trek Contest was named in honor and memory of an AAUW member and teacher who recognized the importance of public speaking skills in teaching students about issues that matter to AAUW, and in gratitude to her family for providing ongoing financial support for the project, a public speaking contest open to all California high school students. In its eleventh year, Speech Trek is an AAUW California Project that begins on the branch level with a speech tournament for local students and culminates with three top statewide finalists performing their five-minute speeches at the AAUW California convention/annual meeting in April. We will need volunteers for this wonderful project but it is not a lengthy commitment and does not involve a substantial time commitment. We will begin with two schools, so we will need people to recruit students who are interested in the contest at the two local schools, then we will need judges, one "tech" person who can help with filming the speeches, and volunteers to help with the final presentation at our annual Tech Trek meeting. These can be short term commitments. We will be working from Oct. 1 until March 1, when the entry videos must be sent to AAUW California. Tech Trek News

Tech Trek CREATES INSPIRATION, EXCITEMENT, and CONFIDENCE in young women about to enter eighth grade.

Tech Trek is a weeklong academic residential camp featuring hands-on activities in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM). Instructors include credentialed middle and high school teachers and professional women in STEM related careers. All camps are located on a university or college campus where campers are immersed in the full campus experience.

At the San Diego camp, located on the UCSD campus, each girl receives an in-depth, week-long course focused on a STEM subject. The interview process begins early next year, and calls for volunteers will go out at that time. This year's Tech Trek Coordinator is Barbara Newton.

Girls are recommended by their 7th grade science, math, or computer teachers and compete for sponsorships provided by their local AAUW branch.

The branches coordinate camper selection and fund the sponsorships that cover all room, board, and educational materials. Each camper and/or her family are responsible for a small fee, which is due upon the camper's selection.

AAUW FUND LUNCHEON — Southern California, October 27th, 2019

For the 2019–20 academic year, AAUW has awarded \$4 million in fellowships and grants to 259 women and community projects. There are 30 Fellows and Grant recipients studying in California in 2019-20 and several will be guest speakers at our three AAUW Fund Luncheons. Six to eight recipients will give a brief overview of their studies or projects and highlight what AAUW's support has meant to them.

There are 9 American Fellows4 International Fellows, 5 Selected Professions Fellows, 10 Career Development Grantees and 2 Community Action Grantees. They are studying at UC Berkeley, UC Los Angeles, UC Santa Barbara, UC Davis, UC San Francisco, UC Irvine, UC Riverside, UC Santa Cruz, UC San Diego, Stanford University, University of Southern California, University of San Diego, Cal State Northridge, Cal State Fullerton, Northeastern University SF, National University LA, Lincoln Law School in Sacramento, Sonoma State University, Azusa Pacific University, Santa Clara University, Golden Gate University SF, Mills College and Southern California Institute of Architecture.

Our two Community Action Grantees are from the Girl Scouts of San Gorgonio Council, Classroom to Career, Redlands and Girls Make VR (Virtual Reality), Arts Bridging the Gap, Los Angeles.
