Scholarship Committee

The Scholarship Committee, made up of members Carolyn Dahl, Dianne Nichols and Barbara Bladen, was fortunate to find two excellent recipients for our Fall 2019 Semester Awards of \$1500.

The first recipient is Rachel Dovsky, a senior at UCSD who is pursuing a Bachelor of Science degree in Cognitive Science which will allow her to enter the field of Human-Computer Interaction. Rachel maintains a 3.67 GPA carrying 16 units and working at more than one job tutoring in music and calculus. She will graduate in June 2020 and plans post-graduate studies in her field.

Our second recipient is Sarah Matthews who is enrolled in the Accelerated Nursing Program at Cal State San Marcos. Some of you met Sarah Last June when she and her husband Travis attended our scholarship celebration. Sarah had been awarded a scholarship that semester as well. Sarah is maintaining an A in her studies. The university advises students not to take a job while they are pursuing this degree. Her mother relocated to help with their toddler Jordy, who is almost two. Most weeks for Sarah are six days, with days starting at 7.00 a.m. and ending when the clinical instructor says to. Rachel and Sarah are looking forward to attending the June Installation and Scholarship Celebration.

AAUW Public Policy Update

The AAUW-supported Federal Employee Paid Leave Act (FEPLA) received bipartisan support. but failed because of absences in the Senate. Members of Congress can still include the FEPLA provision in the final National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) later this year. Currently, the majority of the Senate has expressed support for FEPLA.

Of great interest to our members, the Senate passed the AAUW-supported Building Blocks of STEM Act (S. 737), which would take important steps toward identifying systematic barriers and biases affecting young girls in STEM and computer science. Thankfully our local girls have the opportunity to explore their interest in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math through our Tech Trek Scholarships.

The AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund has been very active in the last few months on two cases related to pay equity. Freyd v. University of Oregon addresses pay discrimination faced by Jennifer Freyd, a professor at the university who is paid substantially less than her male colleagues who hold the same positions, are junior to her, and are no more accomplished. The disparity is due primarily to retention raises, and the case will help to establish whether such raises are considered "a factor other than sex" under the Equal Pay Act. AAUW filed an amicus brief to the Ninth Circuit concerning the case of Aileen Rizo, who is a Legal Advocacy Fund-supported plaintiff who faced pay discrimination in her teaching role due to the use of salary history. N.B. Under A.B. 168, California employers are prohibited from "seek[ing] salary history information" from an applicant. The statute also prohibits employers from relying on an applicant's prior salary history "as a factor in determining whether to offer employment . . . or what salary to offer an applicant."

College/University (C/U) RELATIONS Jasmine Holliday

Dr. Arcela Nunez-Alvarez and Roberto Campos of Census 2020, the San Diego Coalition to promote an accurate census count, particularly of under-counted and "hidden" communities, shared the aims and strategies of the Coalition at the October AAUW meeting.

They enlisted AAUW members' help in advocating for the Census as well as participating in the count. Census representatives had a table outside to recruit workers for the Census, which will be taken in April and vitally affects California's representation in Congress, Federal funding for health and social welfare, and monies for schools and infrastructure. Our speaker for November's "A Legacy of Leadership" AAUW meeting was Chairwoman Brandie Taylor of the lipay Nation of Santa Isabel, who has a Renaissance woman's biography of accomplishments: governance (both tribal and school boards, elected official for 16 years, Warner Unified School District Board); health issues (California Tribal Advisory Committee for Indian Health, Womenheart), culture (Kumeyaay Cultural Repatriation Committee) which is being carried on by her son Hunter who is a traditional Bird Singer and Dancer; land conservancy (Kumeyaay/Digueno Land Conservancy and protesting for water rights, improving housing and roads), as well as raising awareness for higher education, Elder care, tribal youth, veterans.

A heart recipient, she brought information on heart care and programs to our meeting to raise awareness among AAUW members. Further information on Womenheart, the national coalition for women with heart disease which Chairwoman Taylor advocates for, will be distributed at our January meeting, devoted to wellness issues.
