# Interbranch (IBC) - January 2021

The DML Branch is hosting the IBC Meeting on January 23, 2021 with a program on Black Lives Matter.

For those of our members who wish to deepen their understanding of recent events concerning systemic racism, police brutality and protests concerning this issue, the roll back of voting rights in different states, this is a list of books for book clubs and private reading. The list is not exhaustive, but includes those books cited by experts as being insightful and thought-provoking. Reading some of them would be a good preparation for our upcoming IBC meeting in January with our Black Lives Matter speaker. *The Color of Law* by Richard Rothstein, Harvard professor, details from the Jim Crow post-Civil War period how Federal and state policies at all levels used racially discriminatory policies to keep American neighborhoods *de jure* segregated. Robin Di Angelo's *White Fragility: Why It's So Hard For White People to Talk About Racism* discusses the tough topic of white privilege. In *How to Be an Anti-Racist* Ibram X. Kendi, the Andrew W. Mellon Professor in the Humanities at Boston University, and National Book Award recipient, talks about how race is structural and give us tools for confronting our own attitudes. Finally, *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontent* by Isabel Wilkerson, is a groundbreaking look at America not through the lens of race, but of caste, by a Pulitzer-prize winning author. It has just been chosen as an Oprah Book selection.
