National Vote on Open Membership Results

AAUW Board of Directors & Linda Quinby DML President

The initiative to open AAUW's membership did not pass. Changes to AAUW's bylaws require 2/3 majority (66.6%) to pass. AAUW members voted 65.1% to approve the measure, just shy of passing.

On behalf of the AAUW Board of Directors, we are disappointed that the initiative to open AAUW's membership did not pass.

We understand that this outcome may feel exclusionary to some. But AAUW's history is one of continual change and growth, even in the face of challenges. That same resilient spirit must guide us now as we seek to fulfill AAUW's purpose to advance equity for women and girls.

There are many ways to engage with AAUW and support our mission beyond membership. Please encourage members and non-members alike to engage with us — to become <u>Two-Minute Activists</u>, to attend our webinars and events, to apply for a <u>fellowship or grant</u>, and to share the information and resources from our <u>website</u>, which support women's economic empowerment.

The AAUW Board of Directors is committed to AAUW's future and to strengthening the connection with all our members and our community of branch and state organizations. We can all do more to support AAUW's efforts — and we won't stop working for an equitable future for women and girls.



Diversity, Equity and Inclusion: Assembly Bill 2326

How DEI is playing out at the state and national levels: Assembly Bill 2326

Like many of you, for a long time Title IX meant equal practice time and a gym for the women to use equally, in my mind. It took a while, and several local AAUW speakers like Cory Schumaker for me to realize all the ramifications of this truly essential bill. Thanks to Betsy de Vos and her hardline views on following up on sexual harassment complaints, I began to realize that Title IX was about much more than equal sports opportunities; it was in fact about equal and respectful treatment of women in all educational settings.

Today AAUW California is important bill that we all aware of: Assembly Bill by Assembly member Alvarez. The bill is only to ensure equity in academic programming at education institutions, but a transparent process for discrimination, bullying, sexual harassment and

The bill requires that the Chancellors of the Community Colleges, State Universities and the President of the University of California provide a personal, oral annual report to the Senate and Assembly Budget Subcommittees on Education Finance, to be followed by a public Q & A.

The implications and wisdom of this bill are clear: if there is not adequate and consistent handling of Title IX-related complaints, as found in the State Auditor's report in 2023 and again as far back as 2014, the higher education institution will endanger its funding. We are seeing states roll back Title IX provisions and protections every day in our newspapers; Supreme Court Justice Amy Comey in 2020's Doe v. Purdue University turned a sex discrimination statute on its head, using a law meant to prevent and address sexual assault to promote impunity for that very same behavior. This is troubling, indeed, should a similar case come before the Supreme Court. As we have learned, sadly, no protections are assured; they require our vigilance and our votes! Please support Assembly Bill 2326.

Title IX New Rules

All students deserve to go to school and have the freedom to learn and be themselves without fear of harassment or discrimination. While this is the promise of Title IX, opponents have always worked to weaken these crucial civil rights protections. Last month, Title IX took a big step forward!

On April 19, the U.S. Department of Education issued final Title IX rules that strengthen protection for students experiencing sexual harassment. The rules will also ensure equal education opportunities for pregnant, parenting, and LGBTQ+ students. The rule changes include:

- Rework of the past Administration guidance on the handling of campus sexual assault, providing expanded protections for survivors; and
- Expand Title IX protection against sex/gender-based harassment and discrimination to protect members of the LGBTQ+ community. Expansion of rights to the LGBTQ+ community via Title IX aligns this federal law with current interpretation of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act, which prohibits workplace discrimination on the basis of sex/gender. AAUW National serves in a gender equity coalition supporting these changes.

The rules are set to go into effect on August 1, 2024, yet we are already seeing challenges and disinformation spreading. Several states have declared they will not implement the new rules and a congressional challenge in the coming months is expected.

Please tell your members of Congress that sex-based discrimination has no place in education. It is important for them to understand the support for Title IX.






