## DEI

Yes, for the moment we can still use these letters, although for how long is in question. This article is on the sewage mess that has been ongoing for years, caused by problems on both sides of the border with sewage from the Tijuana River. You may be wondering what this has to do with Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, and this article will try to show that ecological damage which produces ongoing severe health problems for low income neighborhoods is at the heart of equitable living standards and including all citizens in the promise of clean, healthy neighborhoods in which to raise children. The University of California San Diego study team led by Dr. Maria-Elena Giner and staff, found indisputable proof of very high levels of toxic, unhealthy air being breathed by residents in proximity to the river, but its more current results were ignored by the Federal panel studying the problem, which chose to use older data and concluded that the levels, while alarming, weren't bad enough to merit a grant to fix the problem. The San Diego County Air Pollution Control District is now distributing 10,000 more air purifiers to eligible households in Imperial Beach, Nestor, Egger Highlands, San Ysidro, Otay Mesa West and Tijuana River Valley, prioritizing household with children and elders over 65, but this is clearly a stop gap measure to combat the hydrogen sulfide from untreated sewage in the river. Will the recent DOD report, which found Navy Seals training off Coronado were contracting acute gastrointestinal illnesses from sewage-tainted waters far north of the Tijuana River area, produce some action on this issue since training has had to be postponed or cancelled, costing the Navy money? The marginalized communities who have suffered from air pollution and worsening health for decades can only hope so. Using your 5 Calls app to contact San Diego representatives to keep up pressure to do something for our South County residents and for ourselves.

## Title IX

As we read Project 2025, it was clear that it was going to affect all the pillars of AAUW, particularly in education. After all, seven of the organizations who participated in the Heritage Foundation project were on the Southern Poverty Law Center's hate group list. As forecast in this document, gender-based decision making has been prohibited and the Education Department notified schools it would not enforce the revised Title IX (1971) scope to recognize harassment based on sexual orientation and gender identity as discrimination. The old rules, relaxed during Trump's first term, required schools to hold live hearings with the accused and accuser facing each other. In the letter sent recently after a judge ruled protections for transgender students unconstitutional, the Biden administration revisions to Title IX were thrown out. "Title IX must be enforced consistent with President Trump's order," the letter stated. The "unitary executive theory" that undergirds this and many other current decisions undergirds these changes.

One important book that provides insight into the news headlines...

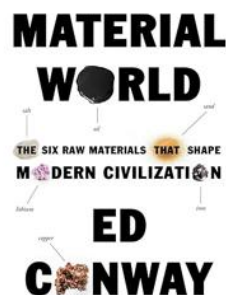
**“What are the physical ingredients without which civilization would grind to a halt and where do they really come from?”**

With that question Ed Conway launches the award-winning (*Economist* Best Book of the Year) *MATERIAL WORLD*, a Substantial Story of Our Past and Future. This is the story of human civilization from an entirely new perspective.

This book is grounded in the human ingenuity that has built the world, the geopolitical forces and power structures designed to control these materials, and the climate change challenges associated with the story of human civilization.

Consider these ordinary, humdrum, cheap, yet almost magical substances: sand, salt, iron, copper, oil, lithium. Except for lithium, a newcomer to human endeavor, we are rarely aware of their fairly benign presences in our lives. Conway makes the case that these six substances, of no value in themselves, are the primary building blocks of the world.

This book is grounded in the human ingenuity that has built the world, the geopolitical forces and power structures designed to control these materials, and the climate change challenges associated with the story of human civilization.

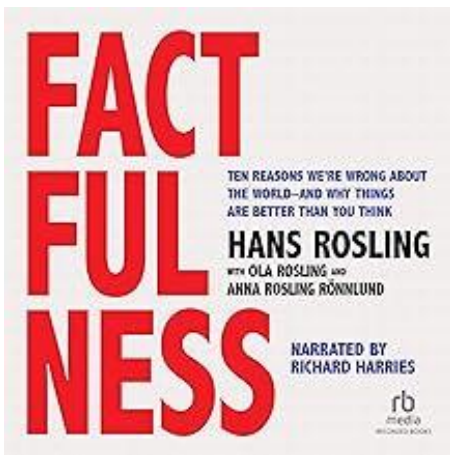
