My presidency is coming to an end, but what a way to go! Overall, this marks the completion of my 6th year as a branch president – 2 years for Antelope Valley Branch in the 1990s, 2 years for DML in 2015-2017, and the 2 years just completed.

Our recent branch events have been outstanding!

Our March event with Carlsbad-Oceanside-Vista Branch featured Dr. Merryl Goldberg on "Music, the Brain, and Spycraft" – including music on her soprano sax. In April we met at the San Diego Botanic Garden (SDBG) to learn about the Garden's medicinal plants and the partnership between the SDBG and CSUSM for research and student mentoring, followed by lunch and a docent-led tour of the gardens.

In May we hosted our 2025 Tech Trekkers plus several Tech Trek alumni, and criminalist Monica McCall of the SD County Sheriff's Office who presented "Forensics: The Science of Solving Crime" – even providing clues for the Tech Trekkers to solve a crime! Thanks to all of you who made these events so successful – with ideas, planning, decorations, and refreshments.

Accomplishments over the past 2 years have exceeded expectations! When I took office in 2023, we were just coming out of Covid, having met virtually for 3 years. As we restarted our in-person programing, the board took a fresh look at our goals, surveyed members for ideas, and worked hard to deliver on what you said you wanted – including trying new things, like holding branch events at the Museum of Making Music and SDBG and starting Explore SD! to sponsor local adventures.

We also expanded and enhanced our college scholarships. The Philanthropy Team decided to increase CSUSM scholarships to \$3,000 a year, renewable for up to 3 years – and then learned that a \$10 million donation from the Daniel and Phyllis Epstein Foundation to CSUSM would double our giving! This new program and match inspired members and friends of DML to increase their giving, resulting in a significant increase in the number of students we can help. (More info on this coming soon.) All this while continuing to support Tech Trek (18 campers this year – 11 in person and 7 virtual!) and MiraCosta College scholarships. Way to go, DML!

It takes a village... We couldn't have done all of this without the efforts of our leaders, chairs, members, and supporters – especially my awesome board members! My heartfelt thanks to all of you for your ideas, dedication, and effort to achieve our goals. The outgoing and incoming board members are now hard at work to create another inspiring, educational, and productive programing year.

AAUW Gets Stuff Done – Nancy Adrian, Friend of the Branch

AAUW California Mobilizes to Advance Priority Legislation

AAUW California advocates came out in full strength on April 8th and 9th to participate in Lobby Days 2025. A total of 197 people representing 66 branches, including the Public Policy Interns and other college students, turned out to advance our priority legislation. 84 people came to Sacramento on April 8th to meet in person with legislative offices: 104 people held virtual meetings via Zoom on April 9th, and nine people met in district offices. We met with 78% of all legislative offices - a record for AAUW California!

While most meetings were with staff, ten meetings were held with legislators. Reports from the teams indicate that all the meetings were courteous and cordial, including those with offices that did not agree with some of our positions. Many teams were received with enthusiasm and gratitude for AAUW's scholarships, activities, and programs such as Tech Trek. Some staffers expressed interest in joining AAUW, and one staffer generously shared information with our Public Policy Interns about a Fellowship program she participated in, which ultimately led to her current job. Overall, we successfully met with 94 offices to advance our key legislation and increased awareness about AAUW and all the things we do to advance gender equity.

The three priority bills presented were:

- Support of SB 771 "Social Media Platforms Endangering Californians" (targeting liability for Al/algorithm generated 'hate speech') (AAUW sponsored). STATUS: Currently in an 'introduced status.' This means a member of Congress has formally submitted the bill to the Senate, marking the beginning of the legislative process.
- Opposition to AB 579 "Yaeli's Law" (protection of youth self-identity). STATUS: As of April 14, 2025, this bill is dead as the Rules Committee did not refer the bill.
- Support of SB 418 –Ensure Equal Access to Care for All" (protection for sex-based discrimination). STATUS: This bill is currently in the Senate Appropriations Committee and was scheduled for Senate Judiciary Committee on May 5, 2025 (results unavailable at this time).

Since AB 579 is now dead, it was quickly replaced with AB 1098, "Title IX and the California Sex Equity in Education Act" as the third "A" priority bill. AB 1098 would expand protections for pregnant graduate students and institute protections for pregnant undergraduate students, prohibiting postsecondary educational institutions from discriminating against a student based on their current, potential, or past pregnancy or pregnancy-related conditions.

You are invited to track the progress of these top three bills, and all the bills on the Legislative Agenda, by viewing the 2025 Bill Tracking Report. The report will continue to be updated as the bills move through the legislative process, so you can always check back to see the latest status.

She was named one of the Top 25 Innovation

Carol's expertise in Innovation and Scholarship Endowment support has been put to good use in DML AAUW's Philanthropic support and programs. The AAUW CA 2025 Annual Event, with a theme of "Pivoting 4 Our Future," was held on April 26. About 140 members attended virtually from CA and OR, including DML members Sharon Griggs, Bobbi Karnes, Donna Lilly, Janice Muller, Christine Oster, Linda Quinby, Dale Satake, and Karen Vanderwerken. AAUW CA board goals are to increase accessibility, improve branch sustainability, and strengthen connections. Two books are being used to guide and inform actions:

Engaging the Head, Heart and Hands of a Volunteer by Barry Altland. Tips and techniques for Equipping, Guiding, Supporting and Inspiring volunteers.

AAUW Board Chair Cherie Sorokin discussed the challenges for AAUW, higher education, equity, and civil rights, and the new AAUW strategic plan, focused on higher education.
