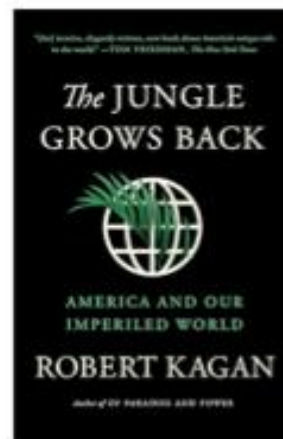

Philanthropy - Strategic Partnership with CSUSM

Our strategic partnership with California State University San Marcos (CSUSM) released a pent-up energy of philanthropy. Okay, maybe a bit of hyperbole, but as of today, a year-and-a-half into the five-year partnership, we have stepped up. There are seven scholars – five funded directly by DML and two funded by the Epstein matching grant.

How we stepped up is worth a moment to reflect. Each scholarship is designed to promote graduation by funding at \$3,000/year for the three (sophomore, junior and senior) years. Three individuals each pledged a total of \$9,000 and chose to name the scholarship. A fourth was funded by members specifically to honor the outgoing president.

Fran Miller—in memory of a wonderful mother
Nancy Adrian—to recognize the dedicated support for Tech Trek
Linda Quinby—to celebrate outstanding leadership
The fifth is an all-Branch-funded scholarship.

Such momentum!

Now, let us turn to the future and the effort to sustain this momentum. The total San Marcos scholarship commitment is eight; we have secured five. The 2026 goal is to complete the funding for the remaining three. We are on our way with one new scholarship commitment.

School Board Project Enters Next Phase

Public education is fundamental to the health and strength of our democracy. It provides all individuals with the opportunity to learn, grow, and contribute meaningfully to society. However, in recent years, public education has faced persistent challenges and repeated attacks that threaten its integrity and accessibility. These ongoing assaults have underscored the need for proactive measures to protect and defend our educational institutions.

In response, the School Board Project was established. Initially, the main focus was to encourage members to actively participate in identifying, recruiting and supporting candidates to run for school boards whose educational values were in line with AAUW California policies. For a number of reasons, the focus shifted to an emphasis on encouraging and training members to attend school board meetings and reporting what they were seeing in their districts.

The School Board Project is now entering its next phase, focusing on monitoring school boards for compliance with California laws. The AAUW California Public Policy Committee is collaborating with the Public School Defenders Hub to ensure our members have the tools to be effective monitors and reporters. A toolkit has been developed for this phase and can be viewed online.

Lobby Days

For Lobby Days 2026, tentatively in early April, members will meet early in the new year. Members will meet with state legislative offices (in person and via Zoom) to inform them about AAUW and advocate for their support of AAUW California's priority bills.



All AAUW members are encouraged to participate in Lobby Days. To ensure that everyone feels comfortable and prepared, the State office will provide training and materials. This support helps make the advocacy process much more approachable, even for those who may be new to legislative engagement.

“The war in Ukraine — Why is peace so elusive?” speaker topic at AAUW event, public invited

The public is invited to a program held by Del Mar-Leucadia Branch of American Association of University Women (AAUW) on Saturday, Oct. 11, 10 a.m. to noon at Encinitas Community Center, 1140 Oakcrest Park Drive. The speaker, Dr. Branislav Slantchev, UCSD political science professor, will discuss problems that prevent reaching a ceasefire, domestic circumstances in Ukraine and Russia, and international politics with a focus on the U.S. and Europe.

Slantchev's research, supported by the National Science Foundation, includes military coercion, intra-war negotiations, the conduct of war, and war terminations. His articles appear in the American Political Science Review, the American Journal of Political Science, International Studies Quarterly, and Security Studies, among others. His book, *Military Threats: The Costs of Coercion and the Price of Peace*, was published by Cambridge University Press in 2011. Slantchev teaches courses in international relations, national security, and game theory, a news release stated.

2026 BOOK WORTHY OF SERIOUS DISCUSSION

The Jungle Grows Back

Heads Up! Guys, we are in trouble. The gardeners are not trimming the jungle. The bad actors are closing in. What are we going to do? Let's ask Robert Kagan.

In *The Jungle Grows Back* Robert Kagan argues persuasively that to preserve the freedom, prosperity, and general peace we currently experience, we must push back. He challenges the reader to understand that the historical norm has always been toward chaos toward the overgrown jungle. The last 80 years of liberal world order are the aberration, requiring a new approach to world order.

Consider:

1. An imperfect liberal order is preferable to one dominated by liberalism's Opponents.
2. Transforming ambitious, autocratic, military powerhouses into pacific, democratic, economic power houses is arduous work.
3. The tragic reality is that it is impossible to wield power, even for the best of causes, with clean hands.

A world order is a set of ideas about how the world should be and a roadmap for a country's foreign policy. The present world order is characterized by liberalism, democracy, and capitalism, not because this is good, right, or better; but because the most powerful nation in the world since 1945 has been a liberal democratic capitalist country.

Kagan clearly describes the present-day challenges to the liberal world order.

Consider:

1. Russian greatness cannot be achieved in a world that is secure and stable. Russia during the Cold War was a global superpower, today Putin dreams of regaining that global status.
2. China, probably the greatest benefactor of the liberal world order, today desires to return to regional and global dominance by displacing the American led liberal order.
3. Iran champions the Radical Islam to elevate the House of Islam over all people.

The liberal world order is precious; it is not preordained, not destined by higher powers, not assured, ensured, or insured. The real choice we Americans face, according to Kagan, is between maintaining the liberal world order, with all the moral and material costs that it entails, or letting it collapse and courting the catastrophes that must inevitably follow.

In summary, who is going to drive the bus?
